# LOCAL NURSE NOW IN POND INLET

We would like to congratulate Asenath Idlout on becoming the first resident of Pond Inlet to become a registered nurse. In 2000, Asenath was the first student to receive support from the Seltzer-Chan Pond Inlet Foundation and she continued to receive a grant each year of her four-year nursing program at Arctic College in Iqaluit. It wasn't easy for Asenath living so far from home, but she persevered and graduated in the spring of 2004. She recently passed her final examination and is now a fully licensed registered nurse.


Asenath is back in Pond Inlet, and now works as one of five nurses at the Health Centre, the first Nunavut-born nurse to work there. In many northern communities, medical staff are from the south, and stay in the community for anywhere from a few weeks to six months. Inevitably, they move back south, or move on to their next assignment. Pond Inlet is fortunate in that Dr. Patricia DeMaio and many of the nurses have lived in Pond Inlet for five years or more, and have become part of the community. Asenath is from Pond Inlet, and she and her family intend to stay. She knows the people in Pond Inlet, and she knows the language and the culture.

Asenath says that her patients often tell her that they appreciate the fact that they don't need a translator to communicate with her. They can describe their symptoms, ask questions and get medical advice in their own language, something that wasn't always possible in the past. As Dr. Demaio puts it, "she can do things that no one else can".

Donors to the foundation can feel proud to have helped, and prouder still of Asenath for having achieved her goal. She set out to become a nurse in order to help her community, and that's exactly what she has accomplished. For the Foundation, providing assistance for post-secondary education helps achieve two goals. Not only does it help the individual student, but also, as in Asenath's case, it can benefit the entire community.

# NEW BOOKS FOR LIBRARY

Residents of Pond Inlet will be able to consult a comprehensive encyclopedia whenever they want information about anything to do with the Arctic, thanks to a donation from the Foundation.
