MUSIC FOR THE FUTURE

Covid-19 related restrictions prevented Tusarnaarniq Sivumut Association (Music for the Future) from providing in-person music workshops in Pond Inlet in 2021. So, instead of sending musicians to the North, the organization sent fiddles. Determined not to allow the pandemic to prevent Inuit youth from learning through music, Music for the Future sent two Stentor student violins and two Menzel violins to the Nasivvik High School in Pond Inlet this fall.

The group is also organizing remote music lessons for youth at the high school through **Connected North**, a program that provides students in remote Indigenous communities with immersive and interactive educational opportunities via high definition, two-way video technology.

An after-school Music Club at the high school is being planned so students in Pond Inlet can continue to connect with each other through music. We hope that in-person workshops will also be part of Pond Inlet's musical future in 2022.

IN-PERSON SCHOOL

Students and staff were glad to resume in-person classes this year. The need to wear masks didn't deter the happy celebration of the end-of-school awards ceremony in May. Nineteen iPads purchased with foundation funds were distributed to deserving students from Grade 7 up.
